
# Welcome!



#### Just Winging it at the January Make-a-thon!

Where might you find a gathering of chickens, flying demon golf carts, flying carriages, a gargoyle demon child, a miniature owl, penguins, shadow wings, dragons, herons, and more? Why, that would be the NCPG Make-a-thon for January 2022!

This was the third Make-a-thon for the guild and full of ingenuity. At our Fall Make-a-thon in 2021, the idea for a thematic Make-a-thon focused on wing mechanisms received an enthusiastic response from participants. For our January event, twenty-five guild members spanning three continents (plus one US Territory) joined together virtually for a weekend centered on wing mechanisms. From Friday afternoon through Sunday evening, guild members worked on wings for puppets – oh, how we soared! Participants ranged in skill levels from beginners to established professionals and everything in between; the mix was energizing. The projects for this weekend demonstrated the full creativity and all the possibilities open to puppetry artists. A variety of birds and winged vehicles made up the majority with a smattering of fantastical beasts. We had puppets in miniature and a puppet with a wingspan of over five feet. To aid in this burst of creativity, there were breakout rooms for troubleshooting, mech-brainstorming, and listening to music (with Leigh Lafosse as our intrepid deejay).

As an added treat, we had artist Laura Mathews as a special presenter to share her expertise in winged creations. She joined in Make-a-thon on Saturday morning for a solid jolt of inspiration as she shared examples of her work up close. Laura is based in England where she creates articulated figures and puppets. Guild members were enthralled by her sparrow puppet, barn owl, a dragon, and more! ## A Conversation with Yolanda Sampson

A lex and Olmsted had the honor of sitting down with NCPG President Emeritus Yolanda Sampson for an enriching conversation about her life as an artist and minister. From talk about her favorite material with which to build (paper), to her favorite song to get inspired (Israel Houghton's *You Are Good*), to details about her forthcoming crankie, we invite you to get to know a little more about the fascinating and innovative Yolanda Sampson.

Alex and Olmsted: How did you get into puppetry?

Yolanda Sampson: Well, when I was 12 years old I was going to the Takoma Park Baptist Church in Washington, D.C. and I had a youth pastor, Retired Captain Chaplain Ollis Mozon, Jr., who introduced puppet ministry at the church. Believe it or not, I was a very shy child but I came alive when I put a puppet in my hand and I found a way to express myself without having to be in front of a crowd. We used to perform at different churches and community outreach days in hospitals, in the prison, and I really enjoyed that. [Chaplain Ollis Mozon, Jr.] became a Navy Chaplain and became a Captain in the Navy and he lives in California right now and does puppets and storytelling.

**A&O:** Do you still keep in touch with him?

YS: I sure do!

**A&O:** Mentors are so important. To be able to keep that relationship going

The mission of the Forgiveness Marathon is to empower people to live a life of forgiveness through your life is profound.

**YS:** It really is. It's been invaluable. He has been a cheerleader, cheering me on, and even with the GO Y.O. Forgiveness Marathon, he just sends me little posts, you know, "Have you considered this?" or, "Have you considered dealing with this particular topic?" He's wonderful.

**A&O:** Speaking of the GO Y.O. Forgiveness Marathon...could you tell us a little bit about what that is?

**YS:** The mission of the Forgiveness Marathon is to empower people to live a life of forgiveness. I don't know about you, but I know that I'm not perfect and none of us are perfect. ... Forgiveness means letting go of the anger, letting go of the bitterness, letting go of the pain and moving on. ... What we find is that many people, because they hold on to that unforgiveness, are unable to move forward in life and live a happy life because they're so busy thinking about what happened in the past that it paralyzes them. That unforgiveness builds fences, but forgiveness builds bridges. This [Forgiveness Marathon] is really to liberate people and to understand that we are imperfect people, everybody needs to forgive somebody, and sometimes in that process we need to forgive ourselves for the things that we did do and the things that we didn't do. With Christianity, we believe that if we need God to forgive us, then we need to make sure that we forgive one another. A&O: Forgiving yourself and other people is so difficult and sometimes it can be such a heavy weight. How have you found using puppetry can help people open up to that side of themselves? **YS:** Well, they're able to see the little skits and see, "Oh, maybe

if I act like that, maybe I have a lot of anger and bitterness inside." ... They're able to see themselves in the puppet in a humorous way. It's like, "Okay. I act like that. Maybe, you know, I need to forgive somebody. I need to pray for them. I need to deal with the situation. Maybe I need to let that person know that I am mad at them and I haven't expressed that before; I'm holding them hostage because of something that they did but I have not communicated that to them." ... A puppet can communicate in a way that is not offensive. The guards are down and it's like, "Maybe that's me?"



**A&O:** One of the recurring characters you use in your work and in the Forgiveness Marathon is Lovuro. Could you tell us a little about the origin of Lovuro?

**YS:** Lovuro was born back in 1992. Wow, a long time ago! Lovuro is from the Planet Peacuro. I have this thought in life: I always look at the glass half full, not half empty. You know, what would life be like if everybody loved one another and cared about one another? Wouldn't this world be a better place? ...It was a time in Washington, D.C. where we were coined as, "The murder capital of the world." There was a lot of violence and a lot of drug distribution and it became a very gloomy kind of place. So Lovuro was born out of that era, like, can't we just all love one another? Can't we just all get along?

**A&O:** For readers who aren't familiar with Lovuro, how would you sum up how she approaches situations? She seems to me sort of the audience surrogate in that she doesn't always react perfectly right away.

**YS:** Actually, she acts opposite from the way that she's supposed to be acting many times! She has to go through these different journeys, these different scenarios in life, to bring her to that place of, "Okay, I need to love. I need to be authentic. I need to be who I was created to be." Many times we are often in that tension and we are in that journey of becoming, and that's where Lovuro is.

**A&O:** Any stories or memories of a particularly special or impactful interaction you've had with an audience or an audience member?

**YS:** Oh my goodness, yes. I remember being in Panama and working with some children with puppetry and they just were so excited that Lovuro came to their country. They were touching her head and saying, "... I want to be like Lovuro!"...So many times the Lord would send me into marginalized communities like the Standing Rock Indian Reservation to work with the kids. I was there at Standing Rock at a time when the U.S. was building a pipeline through that particular reservation. Many people there struggled with alcoholism. Many of the people didn't have good jobs; the only job that you can find on the reservation was at a casino. Many of them experienced a lot of hurt. Coming into those communities and doing puppet making workshops and letting them know how much God loves them, how much God cares for them. I taught them how to create their own little puppet and to be able to express themselves through the puppet so it became like therapy for them.

**A&O:** You're giving them a tool that they can use for the rest of their lives - a tool for communication that they can share.

**YS:** It was the same way going down to the border at the Rio Grande working at the Catholic charities where migrant children were being caged and treated like animals. Many children that came into the Catholic charities didn't know where they were going to go, some came by themselves, some came with one parent or with a neighbor not knowing what's going to happen to them; are they going to be able to remain in the United States? Many were separated from their parents. When I came there I was able to teach them to make their own little portable A Conversation with Yolanda Sampson

stage that they could use and their own little portable puppets. We made sure that it fit in the envelope so they could carry it with them wherever they went. Although there was a language barrier, I had an interpreter with me and you could just see their smiles and the way they were creating and having fun just escaping from life for an hour or two hours. It just brings so much joy.

**A&O:** Could you tell us a little about the crankie you're working on?

**YS:** Actually, it's a crankie that I started working on during one of Heidi Rugg's Make-a-Thons. It tells the story about how Lovuro goes through a transformation from unforgiveness to forgiveness and how she grapples with the pain of being bullied and the isolation that she went into as a result of thinking she's not accepted, not wanted, and different from everybody else. ...She comes to the point where she starts identifying herself with how people treat her instead of identifying herself with how God sees her; that she's loved and accepted how she is. We see in that crankie how she goes through that transformation from tears to joy.

**A&O:** Anything else you're working on right now?

**YS:** I'll be sending some G.O. Y.O. puppet kits to the migrant children [on the Rio Grande] and to the Standing Rock Reservation homeless shelter with instructions on how to put their little puppets together and with scripture, little candies, prayer cards, and little journals.

A&O: That's fantastic! You work so hard for your community and for the bigger community. **YS:** It's a blessing. It's one of the reasons why God created me.

**A&O:** When you take on ambitious projects where you're serving a really wide community from around the world, what are the big challenges that you run into?

**YS:** COVID-19. ...I'm unable to work with as many people as I would like to because there are so many COVID restrictions. Sometimes my imagination is also bigger than my skill set in terms of building so I'll need some help, Sarah and Alex...

A&O: ....We're on it!

**YS:** Those are the major challenges at this time. I'm continuing to learn, to grow, to evolve in my craft and I want to just learn as much as I can on the creative side.

A&O: If time and money and resources weren't an issue, is there a dream show you would want to make? YS: I would continue to build upon the What Time Is It? series that I began years ago and to really address society's ills in the form of puppetry and maybe even have a live musical.

A&O: For our readers, can you tell us a little bit about What Time Is It?

YS: Yes! What Time Is It? was my first video project back in 1995. I was able to fund that particular project because I had won the Miss Black World Beauty and Modeling Pageant. I was traveling around doing the Anheuser Busch Kings and Queens of Africa Storytelling Puppet Show. I was going to different conventions around the country and I started thinking it would be nice just to put it in a video. With the financial resources from the pageant, I was able to fund the What Time Is I? project. It is about Lovuro, our key character from the Planet Peacuro, and her interactions in the community in dealing with the issues in society. It was a fresh blend of puppeteering and music. The first What Time Is It? video was in Blockbuster Video stores in the community service section and Billboard Magazine called it "endlessly creative." It was something that I wanted to continue to build on but along the way I went into ministry and closed that chapter for a little while.

**A&O:** Well, speaking of closing chapters, you recently finished your tenure as our illustrious NCPG president! Congratulations on a well-served term and one that will continue to positively impact the organization for years to come.

**YS:** Oh thank you all! I had the best Vice President ever and the best board team ever. You all bless my life in ways that you would never ever imagine. It was so wonderful to be around other people that are beautiful people inside and out, that love puppets the way I love puppets: we could talk about puppets and projects all day into the night! It was an absolute dream; the workshops, the potpourris, and providing others a platform to share and to learn about puppetry. It was absolutely amazing and something that I will never ever forget. I will be a lifelong National Capital Puppetry Guild member!

**A&O:** What advice would you give to young puppe-teers that are just starting out?

**YS:** For young puppeteers that are just starting out, I would encourage them to join the NCPG where they can be mentored, where they can create, and where they can have a safe place to display their work. It's a place where they can go to workshops and to be able to glean from some of the best puppeteers not only in this region but the entire world. It's that type of place where everybody can learn, everybody can grow, nobody's put down and everyone's accepted. We would encourage every young puppeteer to join the Guild.

A&O: Well, thank you so much for chatting with us, Yolanda! It was great to learn a little more about you and we'll see you at the next meeting! YS: Absolutely! We plan on it.

#### Puppetry History Panel at Virtual Puppet Con NE Edition 2021

Sharon invited me to discuss the 12 Video Oral Histories, as well as the multiple Special Events videos, that my husband, Bob Nathanson, and I have documented for the Puppeteers of America's A-V Library.



#### Dr. Leigh Lafosse - President

Leigh is an active duty military musician, serving the last 15 years as a clarinetist in the U.S. Army Band "Pershing's Own". She received her undergrad and masters from Texas Tech University and her doctoral degree from Indiana University, Bloomington. #### Sarah Olmsted Thomas - Vice President


Sarah Olmsted Thomas is a fifth generation performing artist. She is half of Alex and Olmsted, an internationally acclaimed puppetry duo that was awarded 2017 and 2020 Jim Henson Foundation Grants as well as the 2020 State Independent Artist Award for Performing Arts from the Maryland State Arts Council. Alex and Olmsted has toured the Festival of Wonder in Denmark, the Puppet Festival Chuncheon in South Korea, the Festival de Casteliers in Montréal, and Symphony Space in New York City, among others. Since 2012, Sarah has also been a company member with Happenstance Theater with whom she has devised 10 full-length productions (31 Helen Hayes Award Nominations, 5 wins). Sarah completed an apprenticeship with Bread and Puppet Theater, was awarded a Lisa Simon Scholarship to attend the 2017 National Puppetry Conference at the Eugene O'Neill Theater Center, and has been honored with 2 Helen Hayes Award nominations for Outstanding Lead Actress by Theatre Washington. She is a proud NCPG member since 2018. B.A., Sarah Lawrence College.

#### Heidi Rugg - Secretary

Heidi Rugg is a Richmond-based puppeteer, puppet builder, playwright, director, educator, and founder of Barefoot Puppet Theatre, now entering its 25th year of touring! Working with a widevariety of puppetry styles, she designs, builds, and writes for puppet theatre. She is passionate about puppet mechanisms, STEAM, playwriting for puppetry, and puppetry's applications in education. Heidi is on the teaching artists roster for the Virginia Commission for the Arts and has worked with all ages. She has a special passion for arts integration and has received extensive training through the Kennedy Center, Partner in the Arts, and is a current Wolf Trap Teaching Artist. In 2005, she was awarded an UNIMA-Citation of Excellence for her original work, "Galapagos George." She has received grant support for her work from the Wolf Trap Foundation for the Arts, The Virginia Commission for the Arts, Puppeteers of America, and the Jim Henson Foundation. Heidi holds a Bachelor's of Interdisciplinary Studies in Arts Integration from Virginia Commonwealth University with a minor in Art History. She and her husband, Sam Rugg, reside in Richmond, Virginia.

#### Vanessa Spring-Frank - Treasurer

Vanessa has been a proud member of the NCPG board since the beginning of 2020. As a board member at large, she has helped to double the NCPG membership with the success of the 2020 and 2021 National Capital Puppetry Festivals. Vanessa is a freelance props artisan and puppet builder in the D.C. area working at Theaters such as Imagination Stage, Baltimore Fringe, Round House Theater Center, and the John F. Kennedy Center, among others. #### Alex Vernon - Member at Large


Alex Vernon is an actor, puppeteer, designer and automata engineer. In 2017, the National Puppetry Conference awarded Alex the Eugene O'Neill Theatre Center Scholarship during which time he studied Mechanisms with Jim Kroupa and Marionette Construction with Jim Rose. Since 2012, Alex has been a company member with Washington, D.C.'s award-winning Happenstance Theater with whom he has created 10 original productions. With Happenstance, Alex was nominated twice as Outstanding Lead Actor for the Helen Hayes Awards. In the Spring of 2020 Alex taught as an adjunct professor of Puppetry Arts at the University of Maryland, College Park: Jim Henson's alma mater. Alex built a 6 foot mechanical horse puppet for the Washington Revels, 21 Wayang Kulit puppets for WSC Avant Bard's Midsummer, and a transforming chair for Theater Alliance's Mnemonic; a Bunraku-style puppet that also functioned as a weight-bearing chair. He is one half of the puppet theater duo, Alex and Olmsted.



#### Sam Rugg - Member at Large

Sam has been involved with puppetry since 1996 when he met puppeteer (and wife-to-be), Heidi Rugg. Originally from the Windy City, Sam is known for his work behind-the-scenes with sound systems, stage design, terrible puns, and set construction with Barefoot Puppet Theatre. Sam brings a knowledge and love of power tools to the puppetry scene along with a deep appreciation for all forms of performance. He is in constant search of the perfect touring vehicle. He and Heidi have two daughters and reside in Richmond, Virginia.

Sam has served on the board of NCPG for over twenty years and retains much institutional memory for the organization.



#### Michael Lamason - Member at Large

Michael Lamason is a cofounder and current Executive Director of Baltimore's Black Cherry Puppet Theater where he wrangles puppets, builds new shows, and manages its community arts programming, all while trying to conquer a mountain of administrative tasks. He and the other Black Cherry artists have been touring marionettes, as well as other puppets, and creating innovative puppetry based educational programs in city neighborhoods and across the Mid-Atlantic region since 1980.

String Theory Theater creates their original shows employing various puppetry formats including marionettes, hand and rod puppets, crankies, shadow puppets, toy theater, and large scale festival puppets. String Theory String Theory Theater performs and conducts creative workshops in schools, libraries, and community centers, as well as venues such as The Eubie Blake National Jazz and Cultural Center, BMA, Creative Alliance, Black Cherry Puppet Theater, Baltimore Museum of Art, and many more locations around Baltimore. STT has also traveled to perform on stages at the Detroit Institute of Art, UCONN, and DC more.



#### Mobi Warren - Member at Large

Mobi Warren is both a puppeteer and writer. She is author of a YA novel, The Bee Maker, translator from Vietnamese of several works by Thich Nhat Hanh, and co-founder of a Texas writers/ artists collaborative, Stone in the Stream, that advocates for environmental awareness and justice.
